A delegate shares about the 60th General Service Conference

Every year, policy and direction for AA are discussed at a week-long meeting of trustees, directors, key staff members and 93 elected area delegates from around the U.S. and Canada. This year, instead of New York City, the delegates met in quiet Rye Brook, N.Y. This was my second such General Service Conference. Delegates serve only two years, and the second year for me has definitely been easier because I had a sense of what to expect, what's most important and how to budget my energy to get through the long, difficult week. The official, detailed report is available every fall through your group's GSR, but here are some of the highlights.

A lot of what we do at the Conference is about our literature. This year, among other things, we approved minor updates to the pamphlet "Questions and Answers on Sponsorship." But rejected some proposed updates to the "The AA Member – Medications and Other Drugs" pamphlet, sending it back to the Trustees Committee on Literature for a more extensive review. And we agreed that it's time to update "AA and the Armed Services," a pamphlet that features brief personal stories about AA's in the military. AAs who have served in the military during the last few years were encouraged to read the current pamphlet and send

similar, more recent experiences for possible inclusion in the update.

There was discussion about AAs often having to sign volunteer agreements before carrying the message into institutions such as prisons or mental hospitals. This year the Conference added wording to several corrections, pamphlets, advising our members to carefully read such volunteer agreements before signing them, and to urge corrections professionals to be clear with us about their rules. Some of these forms have become quite elaborate or now involve legal obligations. It was reported that some of our members helped create forms that, for instance, required AAs to provide detailed progress reports on fellow members.

I believe that one of the most controversial things we did was ask the trustees to begin drafting literature that describes our approach to spirituality and how we consider it to be different than religion. This is to respond to the common perception among the public, and even among some judges, that AA is a religious organization—a misconception that may keep away some prospective members. The Conference action specified that this literature should include stories of agnostics and atheists who are successfully sober in AA.

I feel that another area of great interest is always public information. Every year or two the General Service Office spends about \$40,000 to produce public service announcements (PSAs) for TV and radio, and we spend \$35,000 on a service that helps get them out to local stations and tracks whether they're being played. The Conference approved a new PSA this year called "My World." It will still be centrally distributed, tracked and evaluated, now with assistance of local public information committees, who will help distribute it to local TV and radio stations, as described in the PI workbook. Your area PI chair can get you the statistics on whether the PSAs are being played in your area.

We also approved a short animated video for young people, which will be available soon for purchase from AAWS. Like the Young People's videos we approved last year (some of which can be viewed at aa.org), we rely on the local members and PI committees to help distribute it.

A key issue that came up repeatedly this year was the increasing problem of online anonymity breaks on social networking sites. It was discussed that when members publicly reveal their AA membership, whether in online profiles or comments or by signing up for groups or events that strongly imply AA membership, they damage AA's reputation for protecting members' identities. Conference members said this may frighten away prospective newcomers who are concerned about their own anonymity.

Delegates encouraged members to download and review the "Internet Guidelines" sheet from aa.org, share it with other members, and discuss anonymity with their groups. Along those lines, the Conference asked the trustees' Public Information Committee to report back to the 2011 Conference with a draft policy about whether or not to show faces of actors who are portraying AA members or potential members in Conference-approved visual material.

Financially, the GSO reported a good year, but this is mixed news. This is partly due to temporary cost-containment measures, such as not printing the regional AA directories. In larger part, it was reported that it comes from unusually high book sales last spring prior to book price increases

last July. It's expected that book sales will be lower for the next year or two as a result.

The Conference Finance Committee reported that, based on feedback on the finance questions of the last two years, the Fellowship largely agrees with the self-support ideal expressed by Trustees Finance Committee—i.e., that we try to be fully self-supporting through member contributions, but when that doesn't happen, making up the deficit with income from book sales is acceptable.

The committee also said that the key to achieving this ideal will be improved communication about finance, which might take a variety of forms, including detailed information online, in the quarterly finance letters sent to GSRs, clearer financial reports, on posters, in emails or in Grapevine. The Conference asked the trustees to begin collecting self-support stories that "humanize" our talk of finance, which might become part of a pamphlet, book, workbook or self-support toolkit.

The conference approved two actions involving AA Grapevine, Inc. It approved the sending out of brief surveys to Conference members, asking them to share about Grapevine and return the surveys by the end of 2010. The second action OK'd changes to La Vina to move the magazine toward a spiritual parity with Grapevine. La Vina will be bimonthly, staple-free, with a black and white interior, and 64 pages (vs. 48), for one year, to be reviewed in 2012.

Possibly the most important work we did at the Conference was to continue the work of the last few years, begun by our predecessors, of keeping our servants and our fellowship accountable to each other. To this end, we spent a lot of time reviewing the process by which items are added to the Conference agenda. The air of unity and enthusiasm over these efforts was palpable throughout the week.

At the end of the long week, I was exhausted, and oddly both glad and sorry to leave. It was a remarkable experience to serve the Fellowship at that level and see the miracle of our continued growth after 75 years, up close and personal. And while we enjoyed bucolic Rye Brook, many delegates said they looked forward to being back in bustling New York City, where the Conference returns next year. Jim F. St Louis, Mo

We may not need the General Service Conference to insure our own recovery. But we do need it to insure the recovery of the alcoholic who still stumbles in the darkness, seeking the light. We need it to provide, in keeping with the Twelfth Step, a permanent haven for all alcoholics who in the ages ahead can find in AA that rebirth which brought its first members back to life.

We need a Conference to insure AA against government while insulating it against anarchy; we need it to protect the Fellowship against disintegration while preventing over-integration. We need it so that Alcoholics Anonymous and Alcoholics Anonymous alone may be the ultimate repository of its own Twelve Steps, its Twelve Traditions, and all of its Services.

We need a Conference to insure that changes within AA come only as a response to the needs and wants of all AA, and not of any few. We need it to insure that the doors of the halls of AA shall never have locks on them, so that all people with an alcoholic problem for all time to come may enter these halls unmasked and feel welcome. We need it to help insure that Alcoholics Anonymous never asks anyone who needs help what his or her race is, what his or her creed is, or what his or her social position is. Bernard B. Smith

Sitting in Silence, Listening

In early sobriety it was suggested to me that I think of prayer as talking to God and meditation as listening. That idea took hold. I sobered up in 1972; in 1984 I learned how to meditate at a Catholic retreat center, under a priest who had spent 25 years in Japan studying Zen Buddhism. That was my introduction to the practice of meditation, and it took.

In 1985 I was down and out with chronic fatigue, so I began a meditation meeting in my home, mostly to get up and out of bed. My group, mostly local women alcoholics, met from 7 to 7:30am, Monday through Friday. There was no talking. It was just sitting in silence, listening, for 30 minutes. At 7:30 I’d gong a gong and we’d all stand in a circle and bow, using the word Namaste, which means “I honor the divine in you.” They’d leave and I’d go back to bed.

It’s now years later and I’m into my sixth year of healing from chronic fatigue. I believe that there’s a touch of good in every single thing. The biggest gift of living with chronic fatigue for 19 years is that I became dedicated to meditation – listening to God – and I learned how to quiet my mind. The morning meditation ended a few years ago, but a Wednesday night meditation group continues. The best gift of meditation, from my perspective, is that I’ve been introduced to the Spirit of the Universe by experiencing it in the very breath that I breathe. I love that God is available to all equally, that he’s all about love, and that some of us experience that source of love by simply practicing the AA principles in all our affairs.
